

Share the Mystery of New Guinea's 'Missing Plane'

Some good reading in a top-level magazine — and book — await members of the 345th and others who remember Papua in World War II. Susan Sheehan, who spoke at the Women's Breakfast during the Columbus Reunion, is the author of A Missing Plane, a gripping true story that involves some connections to the 345th. The story began its three installments in mid-May in The New Yorker Magazine. It also is scheduled to come out later in book form.

Ms. Sheehan is married to Neil Sheehan, also an author and a Pulitzer-Prize winning reporter for the New York Times who covered the Vietnam War.

Ms. Sheehan's book is being pubished by Putnams.

Her true story involves the finding of the wreckage of a World War II U.S. military plane in the New Guinea jungle. Such a finding is not uncommon, and a special U.S. team has been locating planes and identifying the dead for some years. The suspense and mystery lie in who was on the plane and what was their mission.

The story, in 3 installments, can be found in the New Yorker Magazine issues of May 12, 19 & 26, 1986.

Can You Beat This Record?

Sending his best regards "to any of the 498th B.S. that might remember old "Cross Bob" in the New Guinea campaign," Bob Cross reports flying a total of 128 missions with 743 combat hours.

He says he walked out of four crackups, out of the top of the aircraft twice.

His missions included 56 from Port Moresby to Biak Island, 26 under General Chenault and 46 missions from Yokota Air Force Base, Japan. He was wounded at Kavieng, New Ireland.

Bob Cross sends his best to all who might remember "The Inpatient Virgin," Major Kilgore and crew. "Good health and happy happy to all."

When **Ed Bina** came up with the idea of building a 345th Memorial at the Air Force Museum, many told him it couldn't be done. Most felt contributions received would not be sufficient to meet the goal. As usual the 345th came through funding the Memorial and the benches that are now in place.

As of 15 May 1986, a total of \$20,553 was received. Of 1,315 members on the rolls, about 10.1% contributed. There were 266 donations of \$100 or less and 71 of \$100 or more. Of those larger donations, 6 came from HQ, 16 from the 498th, 11 from the 499th, 8 from the 500th and 30 from the 501st.

Of donations under \$100, 12 came from HQ, 44 from the 498th, 75 from the 499th, 59 from the 500th and 76 from the 501st.

Also, \$250 was received from a 38th Bomb Group member.

Among the first to respond to the call were **Colonel True** from HQ, **John K. Zollinger** from the 498th, **C. L. Shell** from the 499th, **Robert T. Henderson** from the 500th and **Stanley J. Roberts** from the 501st.

Although the Memorial and benches are paid for, additional funds could be used to maintain the site. In addition a tree planted on our site would be an outstanding addition and would add shade and beauty to our Memorial. Any amount would help.

If you haven't contributed as yet, and would like to be included as a contributor to the 345th Memorial, any amount, however small, would still be welcomed.

Chaplain Ed Karnis Retires with a Footlocker of Medals

Col. Edward J. Karnis thinks he may have been "the last Air Apache Bat outa Hell on Active Duty."

Ed retired last fall from the U.S. Army, where he was the oldest Chaplain on duty and the senior colonel on active duty in the Chaplain Corps.

He was a navigator with the 345th Bomb Group, 499th Squadron, flying 48 combat missions. And his decorations from World War II and later fill nearly half a page of single-spaced

Legion of Merit, Bronze Star, Department of Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Army Meritorious Service Medal (2), Purple Heart, Armed Forces Reserve Medal (3), Atlantic Theater Ribbon, Southwest Pacific Theater (7 stars), Vietnam Ribbon (4 stars), Viet Nam Service Ribbon, Army Overseas Ribbon (2), Humanitarian Service Medal (2), Republic of China Defense Medal, U.S. Presidential Unit Citation, Vietnam Cross of Gallantry with Palm, Philippine Liberation Medal (1 star).

Plus: World War II Victory Medal, National Defense Medal (2), State of Delaware Service Medal and Air Medal

Ed had attended Annapolis just before World War II service. He left the service - for a time - with the rank of Captain in the Air Corps in 1946.

He got a college degree and attended the FBI Academy, later serving as a Special Agent in Detroit, Miami and New York.

But that wasn't enough, by any means. Ed entered St. Mary Seminary and University in Baltimore in 1956 and in 1960 he was ordained a Roman Catholic priest. Ed returned to active duty as Chaplain and Major in the U.S. Army at Fort Bragg, North Carolina.

In 1967 Ed was Brigade Chaplain for the First Air Cavalry Division in Vietnam. He later served as Chaplain at Fort Dix, New Jersey, as Command Chaplain for the U.S. Army Security Agency in Europe and as Division Chaplain of the Third Infantry Division, Europe.

Ed also served at Fort Benning, Georgia, Fort Wadsworth, New York. Fort Meade, Maryland and in the Republic of Korea.

Just before retirement, Ed was Chaplain at HQ, Frankfurt Military Commu-

nity in Germany.

Former Lt. Madson Gets DFC, 40 Years Late

Last fall, Richard P. Madson of Fort Dodge, Iowa — formerly with the 499th Squadron's - received the Distinguished Flying Cross for extraordinary achievement in taking part in aerial flight at Saigon, Vietnam (then Indochina), April 25, 1945.

The honor came only about 40 years

According to the Fort Dodge Messenger, Madson explained that the records probably were lost because his outfit moved quite a bit.

He said he "never tried real intensely to get the award."

When Madson earned the award he was First Lieutenant with the 345th Group (M) 1036, Navigator, Army Air Corps. He was in service from July, 1942, to October, 1945.

Distinguished Flying Madson's Cross was presented in Fort Dodge by U.S. Rep. Jim Lightfoot of Iowa.

The mission for which Madson sank nine received award the Japanese vessels in addition to destroying barracks and warehouses and seven other vessels, according to the award citation. It stated that Madson's "control and self-possession did much to relieve the tension accompanying the run and contributed to the success of the attack."

Madson's explanation was that in the Saigon bombing his plane ran into more anti-aircraft fire than expected and he changed the route so his crew got out where other planes hadn't.

Al Naigle, who had served as 500th vice president, was buried at Arlington National Cemetery.

Tom Cunningham was buried at North Fork, California, his home, with a VFW service.

Word has been received from Jean Assmann of the death of Florian Assmann on 31 August 1985. She said they had always hoped to attend a reunion, and maybe she will join us some day in the future.

Phyllis W. Rice, wife of Charles E. Rice Jr., reports from Lutherville, Maryland, of his death on 12 February 1986.

Raiph S. Wallace of the 500th died recently. His plane, the "Tondelayo." was featured on the cover of Warpa Across the Pacific by author Lawrence J. Hickey. Wallace was the pilot who flew the famous mission over Rabaul in the fall of 1943. He is survived by his widow, Bonnie.

345th's Distinctions Recalled

A newspaper's V-J Day 40th Anniversary story gave J. Edward Myers a chance to recall his experiences with the 345th Bomb Group. Myers is a retired Air Force lieutenant colonel and a retired IBM engineer living in Greencastle, Indiana.

Banner Greencastle For the Graphic, Myers recalled how the 345th escorted Japanese aircraft to make plans for the formal signing of the Japanese surrender on the USS Missouri.

"Aside from the escort honor given to our bomb group, what we feel is especially unique is the fact that we were the very first Americans to make contact with the former enemy under other-than-war conditions."

Myers also noted that the 345th lost more men than any other Air Force group and also sank more ships than any other group in the Pacific.


- Each Squadron may have a team not to exceed six men, one of whom is to be their spokesman and leader.

Start organizing your Squadron team NOW so you will be competitive in the contest . . . and pay particular attention to rules #4 and #7 above.







Bruce Hoy, curator of the aviation museum in Papua, New Guinea, reports to **Ken McClure** of Columbus, Ohio, that he enjoyed a visit from the 500th Bomb Squadron group who came through his territory recently.

"Hope one day you will be able to make it back to these shores — after all, you did leave a B-25 in the waters off Manus," Hoy wrote. He has been instrumental in helping to find downed World War II planes in New Guinea and has been written up by writer Susan Sheehan in her articles and book titled Missing Plane.

Randall Bond, art librarian at Syracuse University, is looking for material for a book he is preparing on World War II airplane nose art.

Bond says he is seeking individuals "who either executed such art or used it on their aircraft. I am interested in how and why subjects/motifs were chosen and any memories/stories about individual examples." He says he also

is interested in anyone with photos of nose art, which "will be promptly returned after copying."

Ex-navigator, bombardier and copilot **Rip De Pascal** remembered New Guinea and other wartime Pacific locales in an article for the Tuscon Citizen on the 40th Anniversary of V-J Day.

De Pascal, now a teacher at Tuscon's Amphitheater High School, recalled how the war hit him when he and other graduates of an Army Air Force navigator and bombardier training school arrived on New Guinea.

"We were replacing people who forgot to come back," De Pascal said.

He also described flying a B-25 as low as 50 feet above the ground under command of Col. "Pappy" Gunn.
