Colorado Springs ahead for 1994







Lost paper trail tale

I had a rather tenuous association with the 5th Air Force and the 345th. My crew and I left Greenville, SC in August of 1944. picked up a new B-25J in Savannah and flew to McClellan Field in Sacramento. The three-day modification turned into 10 days. It was another 10 days before we arrived in Port Moresby where we sat for a couple of weeks. When other crews arriving after us were sent on to Nadzab, I asked, "Why?" "Who are you," was the reply. It turned out that our papers were sent off to Nadzab the day we arrived and we were "lost." We flew several courier missions for Port Moresby, and despite their requesting we stay to fly for them, we insisted we were a combat crew, so we were finally sent along. After two weeks at

ab I again inquired why we were not gpre-combattraining. "Who are you?" It turned out our papers were lost again. We finally finished our two "practice missions" on Wewak and were sent off again, only to arrive at Biak and be assigned to the 345th on the day of shipping out for the Philippines. I was permitted to stay at Biak while the rest of the crew boarded ship. Two of my crew members, Howard and Bisesi were killed when the ship was kamikazied in Leyte Harbor. Strangely enough, I never flew another mission with any member of my crew! I missed a number of vital missions during February and March of 1944 as I took a pickup crew on the very last leave to Sydney! Because there was no transportation back, we were gone for six weeks and the 345th finally sent a C-47 to pick up the crews on leave. My crew was fortunate enough to be asked to fly a B-25H back for 5th Bomber Command so we had several extra days in

Australia and returned to the 345th, which by then was at San Marcelino.

I participated in the raid on Saigon, and barely was able to make it back in 016 with almost maximum right rudder trim and maximum right aileron with my foot resting on a flak helmet and my knee cushioned at the wheel by a 1st-aid pack. There was not enough gas left to start the engines. When one considers the two months it took to get assigned to the 345th, the two-month wait at Biak until we could move to the Philippines, my leave in Sydney (and also to Manila) I probably got my 37 missions in faster than any other pilot in the Group. Consequently, I made few acquaintances with any members of the 501st other than Ted Hart and his crew (for whom I had the responsibility of sending their effects to their families). Keep the Strafer coming - I look forward to each issue.

One cold night in '42 -

Have you ever been in Columbia. SC on a cold early winter night? Well it does not get any colder. I had just joined the new cadre of the 345th Bomb Group. As a qualified radio operator I was placed on an air crew with a Lt. Mayer* as pilot. Our new B25 D's started to arrive and were placed on hard pans on the field. We, as crew, were placed on guard duty at night. My first duty was a nightmare. It rained and was cold, I have never been so cold in all my life. I tried to burn hydraulic fluid, but no go. It just got colder. In the distance I heard this jeep, stopping at the various hard pans. It was the new second in command Lt. Col. True. We were well briefed on him, Point graduate and all. A real hard nose. He wheeled into the pan and got out and started to walk toward me. My knees shook. what should I do? "Halt!" I shouted. He kept coming. I put a round in the chamber and shouted halt again. This time he stopped. "For Gods sake soldier its the OD," he said. I told him to advance four steps and place his I D on the grow "Now take four steps back," I said wallet got soaking wet. This was my first meeting with our new chief, I figured my last. He did acknowledge that my actions were correct and that some of my buddies would be in for some big trouble. I can't believe this was nearly fifty years ago.
